## **Quick and Handy Grammar Review**

Prepositions have many uses in English. For example, they can express time (*in 2012, at 7:00, during the meeting*), place (*on the chair, at a restaurant, behind the sofa*), direction (*to the store, from Japan*), method (*by mail, with a fork*), material (*of wood, with cotton*), etc. Let's take a look at some common prepositions in English, and then we'll practise using them.

#### **A. Common Prepositions**

The following is a list of common prepositions, some notes on their use, and examples.

Preposition	Meaning(s)	Examples

#### **B. Prepositional Phrases**

One of the most common constructions in the English language is the prepositional phrase. Sometimes there are even two or three prepositional phrases used in the same sentence. (E.g., *In 2015, she travelled to Chile*.)

A basic prepositional phrase has three words: *preposition, article, noun.* This is the most common construction. Other words, such as adjectives, may be added. The article is not used in some phrases, and the noun may be replaced by a pronoun. Analyze the following examples:

#### preposition + article + noun

• to India

- in the closet over the chair
- to the bank
- from an admirer

- to India
- near New York

preposition + noun

• after lunch

#### preposition + pronoun

- toward me
- with them
