- 1. Barack Obama was the first African American president. He was born in Hawaii in 1961. His **nickname** was *Barry*. His mother was from Kansas, and his father was from Kenya. After his parents **divorced**, he lived with his grandparents.
- 2. After high school, Barack Obama moved to the US **mainland**. He went to Harvard Law School. He met his wife, Michelle, in a law office. They had two daughters, Malia and Natasha (*Sasha*).
- 3. Obama had strong speaking and writing **skills**. In 2004, he joined the US Senate. Four years later, Barack Obama ran for president. He told Americans, "Yes, we can!", and he won the **election**.
- 4. On January 20, 2009, Barack Obama became the 44th president of the United States. Obama's **government** made important changes for America. They **brought** American **troops** home from Iraq and Afghanistan. They also **improved** the health care system and the **economy**. In 2012, Obama told Americans, "It begins with us." He won the election again.

The type of reading above is a *biography*. A biography describes the main events in a person's life. Read the biography again. Look for the following:

1.	Family Words: Examples: mother, father	2.	Proper Nouns: Examples: <i>Hawaii, Kansas</i>

Note:

A proper noun needs a capital letter. It refers to a specific (not general) person, place, or thing. In general, a mother is not a proper noun. When used as a name (e.g., I asked Mother to call us tonight), it is a proper noun. When used with a pronoun, (e.g., I'll call my mother), it is not a proper noun.
