GRETA THUNBERG

- 1. Greta Thunberg is an environmental **activist** from Sweden. At the age of 16, she took a year off from school. She wanted to fight for the planet.
- Greta was a quiet child. She studied climate change and often felt depressed about it. Her first protest was silent. She sat outside Sweden's parliament with a sign that said "School Strike for Climate." This silent protest helped Thunberg find her voice.
- Greta Thunberg began to organize weekly walkouts. She called them
 Fridays for Future. Students around the world joined her. A year later,
 she led the Global Climate Strike. At least four million people joined the
 protest. It was one of the largest environmental protests in history.
- 4. In 2019, Thunberg took an environmentally friendly sailboat across the Atlantic. She went to a global warming **conference** in New York. She also spoke as a youth leader at the United Nations Climate Action Summit. Her message to world leaders was loud and clear: "You are **failing** us!"
- 5. Greta Thunberg doesn't want leaders to listen to youth. She wants them to listen to science. Thunberg believes the science is *crystal clear*: We are running out of time to save our planet.

PRESENT PROGRESSIVE

A. Reference

We use the **present progressive tense** when an action (e.g., climate change) is happening **now**.

The present progressive has two parts: the *Be* verb and the *-ing* form of the main verb.

• The earth's temperature is rising.

In her UN speech, Greta Thunberg used the present progressive tense:

- People are suffering.
- People are dying.
- · Ecosystems are collapsing.

To make a negative present progressive sentence, use *not* between *B*e and the *-ing* verb.

• You are not listening.
