

Focus on Exams

1. International English Language Testing System (IELTS)

Description: IELTS is a widely recognized English proficiency exam that assesses a candidate's language skills in listening, reading, writing, and speaking. It is accepted by numerous educational institutions, employers, and immigration authorities across the globe.

2. Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)

Description: TOEFL is a standardized test to measure the English language ability of non-native speakers wishing to enroll in English-speaking universities. The test comprises four sections: reading, listening, speaking, and writing.

3. Cambridge English Qualifications (CEFR)

A look at the IELTS

The IELTS (International English Language Testing System) is a standardized English proficiency exam taken by non-native speakers who wish to prove their English language capabilities for work, study, or immigration purposes. It evaluates test takers' abilities in four areas: listening, reading, writing, and speaking. The IELTS exam is available in two formats – the IELTS Academic, which is designed for students wanting to study at institutions where a high level of language proficiency is required, and the IELTS General Training, which focuses on basic survival skills for those planning to work or live in an English-speaking country.

How to apply

To apply for the IELTS exam, follow these steps:

- 1. Visit the official IELTS website: Head to the official IELTS website at www.ielts.org and navigate to the "Book a Test" page.
- 2. Choose your test format: Select whether you want to take IELTS Academic (for higher education/professional registration) or IELTS General Training (for work, migration or study below degree level).
- 3. Find a test center: Use the search bar on the "Book a Test" page to locate nearby test centers.

 Select your desired test location and, if applicable, choose a computer-delivered or paper-based test.
- 4. Check for test dates and availability: Browse through the available dates at your chosen location.

 Pick one that best suits your schedule and allows you sufficient preparation time.
- 5. Create an account: To proceed with registration, create an account on the IELTS website by providing personal information such as name, email address, and a secure password.
- 6. Fill out the online application form: Log in to your newly created account and complete the application form by providing accurate details about yourself, including personal information, ID details, educational background, and test preferences.
- 7. Choose your Speaking test slot: Schedule your Speaking test based on available slots. Note that it may be scheduled on the same day as other sections or within seven days before/after them.
- 8. Upload a clear photograph of your identity document: Provide a clear photo of your passport or other accepted ID for verification purposes. Ensure it meets the image requirements specified on the website.
- 9. Pay for the registration fee: Complete your registration by paying the required exam fee using one of the accepted payment methods like credit card or bank transfer.
- 10. Receive confirmation email from IELTS: After completing the above steps, you will receive an email confirming your test date and venue from IELTS.
- 11. Prepare for the exam: Utilize study resources available online, through test prep centers, or in print. Familiarize yourself with the test format and improve your overall English proficiency to ensure a successful outcome.
- By following these steps, you'll successfully apply for the IELTS exam and be on your way to achieving your desired score. Good luck!

Exams IELTS Speaking: What's involved?

The IELTS speaking test is a crucial part of the International English Language Testing System examination, designed to assess a candidate's spoken English skills. The test lasts for 11-14 minutes and consists of three parts:

- 1. Part 1: Introduction and Interview (4-5 minutes)
 In this section, the examiner introduces themselves, confirms your identity and puts you at ease with some general questions about your background, work, studies, hobbies, or interests. The aim is to get you comfortable speaking in English before moving on to more complex topics.
- 2. Part 2: Individual Long Turn (3-4 minutes)
 During this section, you will receive a topic on which you need to speak continuously for about 2 minutes. The examiner provides a task card containing the topic and points you should cover during your talk. You have one minute to prepare and take notes before you start speaking. After your monologue, the examiner may ask one or two questions about your talk.
- 3. Part 3: Two-way Discussion (4-5 minutes)
 In the final section, the examiner engages you in an in-depth discussion related to the topic from Part 2. They might ask follow-up questions or introduce new ideas for discussion. The aim is to evaluate your ability to express and justify opinions, analyze situations, and speculate about various issues.

To perform well in the IELTS Speaking test, practice active listening, ensure fluent responses by expanding on given topics, use diverse vocabulary accurately and appropriately, and demonstrate accurate grammar usage while maintaining pronunciation clarity.

IELTS Speaking: Let's practice

Here's an example of an IELTS Speaking Test question for Part 1: Introduction and Interview, which lasts for 4-5 minutes.

Examiner: Good morning/afternoon. My name is [Examiner's name]. Can you please tell me your full name?

Candidate: Good morning/afternoon. My full name is [Candidate's full name].

Examiner: Thank you. Can you please show me your identification?

Candidate: Sure, here's my [type of identification, e.g., passport].

Examiner: Thank you, that's great. Now, let's start with the first topic - Hobbies and Interests. Now practice answering the following questions with an English speaking friend or family member.

- 1. Can you tell me about your hobbies or interests?
- 2. How much time do you spend on your hobbies?
- 3. Are there any new hobbies or activities you would like to try in the future?
- 4. Do people in your country generally have the same hobbies as you do, or are they different?

In Part 2 of the IELTS speaking test, you will be given a topic card and have 1 minute to prepare your response. You will then be expected to speak for around 2 minutes uninterrupted. An example of an IELTS speaking test question for Part 2 could be:

"Describe an important skill you learned when you were young.

You should say:

- What the skill is
- How and where you learned it
 - Why it was important
- Explain how this skill has been useful to you in your life."

Remember to speak clearly and coherently, providing specific details and personal experiences related to the topic.

GRAMMAR FOCUS



Simple Past

The simple past tense has two main forms: regular and irregular.

- 1. Regular verbs: These verbs follow a standard rule when forming the simple past. To create the simple past of a regular verb, you typically add "-ed" or "-d" to its base form. For example, the simple past of "walk" is "walked," and the simple past of "work" is "worked." Some regular verbs may require minor spelling modifications when adding "-ed," such as doubling the final consonant for verbs ending in a single vowel followed by a single consonant (e.g., "stop" becomes "stopped").
- 2. Irregular verbs: These verbs do not follow the standard rule for creating the past tense. Instead, they have unique forms that must be memorized or looked up in a reference source. Common examples of irregular verbs include "be" (which becomes "was" or "were"), "begin" (which becomes "began"), and "run" (which becomes "ran"). Notably, some irregular verbs have identical base and past forms, such as "put" and "cut."




Cooking Traditional English

This month we are going to take a close look at the traditional English breakfast.

An army marches on its stomach!

So let's start the day as we mean to go on With bacon, sausage, baked beans, eggs, hash browns, tomatoes, toast and of course fried bread. Yes it will set you back a truck load of calories. But come on, who cares.

So, let's cook

Ingredients:

2 sausages, 4 rashers of bacon, 2 slices of black pudding, 2 medium eggs, 1 large tomato, halved, 1 cup of sliced mushrooms, 2 slices of bread, 1 can of baked beans.

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat a large frying pan or griddle on medium heat.
- 2. Cook the sausages for 10 to 12 minutes, turning them frequently until they are browned and cooked through.
- 3. While the sausages cook, add the bacon to the pan and cook for about 4 to 5 minutes on each side or until crispy.
- 4. Add the black pudding to the pan and cook for about 3 minutes on each side until heated through and slightly crisp.
- 5. Once done, remove the sausages, bacon, and black pudding from the pan and set them aside on a warm plate.
- 6. In the same pan, crack the eggs and fry them sunny-side up for about 3 minutes or until the whites are set but yolks remain runny.
- 7. Remove the eggs from the pan and set aside with other cooked items.
- 8. Add a touch more oil to the pan if needed, then place halved tomatoes in it cut-side down along with sliced mushrooms. Cook for about 3 minutes or until both have softened and browned slightly.
- 9. Place bread slices directly onto your oven rack at low heat or pop them in a toaster until lightly golden brown.
- 10. Heat baked beans in a small saucepan over medium-low heat just until heated through (approximately 3-4 minutes), stirring occasionally.

Serve everything on a plate: Sausage, bacon, black pudding, fried egg, tomato, mushrooms, toast, and a side of baked beans. Enjoy your traditional English breakfast!
