With the verb "have", we generally use the word "got" and we say "I've got", "you've got", "he's got" etc. We say "I have a pen" or "I have got a pen".

Have I got two eyes?

Yes, you've got two eyes

Have you got two ears?

Yes, I've got two ears

Has he got two legs?

Yes, he's got two legs

Has she got two hands?

Yes, she's got two hands

Have we got two heads?

Yes, we've got two heads

Have they got four arms?

Yes, they've got four arms

The meaning of "any" and "some" is "...", but we use "any" in questions and negative sentences, and "some" in positive sentences. For example, we say "Are there any books on the table?" – "Yes, there are some books on the table", and we say "Are there any books on the floor?" – "No, there aren't any books on the floor".

We use "any" in a non-specific question, when the number is not important. For example, "Are there any books on the table?" – "Yes, there are some books on the table", or "No, there aren't any books on the table". If the number is important, we use "How many" and there is a specific answer – "one", "two", "three" etc., or "none".

What's the difference between "any" and "some"?

The difference between "any" and "some" is that we use "any" in questions and negative sentences, whereas we use "some" in positive sentences

### **any**

Are there any books on this table?

Yes, there are some books on this table

Are there any pictures on these walls?

Yes, there are some pictures on these walls

Have you got any shoes on your feet?

Yes, I've got some shoes on my feet

### **not any**

Are there any books on the floor?

No, there aren't any books on the floor

Are there any pictures on that chair?

No, there aren't any pictures on that chair

Are there any chairs on the table?

No, there aren't any chairs on the table

**none**

**class**

**classroom**

How many books are there on the table?

There are ...  
books on the table

How many books are there on the floor?

There are none

How many pictures are there on these walls?

There are ... pictures on  
these walls

How many pictures are there on that chair?

There are none

How many students are there in this classroom?

none

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
